On May 14th, the Labor Guild's students, teachers, staff, and friends all gathered to celebrate the graduation of our 132nd class of Labor Guild School. While the labor movement is facing tremendous uncertainty, our commencement ceremony celebrated the dedication, growth, and leadership of our 66 graduating students.

Our 66 graduates represented more than twenty different unions and organizations and made up one of our largest graduating classes in recent memory. Many also participated in the Labor Guild's new Youth Caucus, which was created this semester.

## **LABOR GUILD** YOUTH CAUCUS

This last school term, for the first time in the Guild's history, the Labor Guild's Young Worker Caucus (LGYC) was created. This "Futures/Next Generation" style group aims to provide a much-needed place of

discussion, networking and organizing for the exceptional young workers of the Guild.

After the success of the Young Worker Workshop series, hosted by Teamsters Local 25 in Charlestown, the Guild has realized the willingness and demand in the Greater Boston Labor Movement for young worker engagement and education. With that in mind, and with the abundance of young labor leaders among the Guild's student body, the LGYC was created.

Following the member-driven focus of many unions' Futures groups, the group's decisions and outreach are entirely decided by its members. Four co-chairs have been chosen to lead and represent

a variety of different unions attending the Guild. The cochairs currently are: Walter Gardner, LiUNA! (Laborers) Local 609, Phil Alvarado, NPMHU (Mailhandlers) 301, Ryan Murphy, LiUNA Local 609 and Robert Ramos, Pipefitters Local 537.

Currently the LGYC is almost entirely male, but to accurately represent the Guild's student body, there will need to be young female leaders as well. If you know anyone interested, please contact the Guild.

The goal of the caucus is to build the voice of the young people of the Guild, to increase outreach and recruitment of young workers to the Guild and to shape future classes and programs towards Young Continued on pg. 2

## **GUILD HOSTS A FAITH AND SOCIAL JUSTICE PANEL**

Community and congregation members gather for interfaith discussion

On May 24th, a panel of five interfaith leaders spoke at the Labor Guild on the topic of "Faith and Social Justice" and their work on the topic in Greater Boston. The panel included Laura Wagner, Executive Director of Unitarian Universalist Mass Action Network; Norm Faramelli, Episcopalian Priest, theologian and board member of MA Interfaith Worker Justice; Mayra Axner, Regional Director of the Jewish Labor Committee; Jack Trumpbour Research Director of Harvard Law's Labor and Work Life Program and member of Catholic Scholars for Worker Justice; and Fr. Peter Gyves, **S.J.,** Director of A Faith That Does Justice.

As part of the panel, each speaker was asked to explain their organization and their faith's efforts towards social justice in Greater Boston. Some of the panelists belong to "Action Networks" like **Laura** Wagner with the Unitarian Universalist Mass Action Network, which operates between the 142 Unitarian Universalist Congregations in Massachusetts. Wagner mentioned "working groups," as a viable means of organizing a massive network into focused efforts on different justice issues, whether economic, social, environmental or otherwise.

Some faith-based groups, like **Peter Gyves'** organization, A Faith That Does Justice, who organize four annual "Community Meetings" opportunities, each highlighting an urgent social justice issue such as racism, the struggles of women in the workplace, and homelessness.

#### Speaker Marya Axner

discussed the Jewish Labor Committee's roots dating back to their founding as means for Jewish Laborers to fight the growth of Nazism. As Marya Axner put it, "Organizing and social justice are central to Judaism. The Jews abandoning the pyramids in Egypt was really, when you think about it, them 'walking off the job'.".

Norm Faramelli spoke movingly on the moral and ethical contradictions of our economic system, citing the abuses of the subcontracting system. His recent work with MA IWJ directly tries to address both issues through their support and solidarity of the ReadyJet Service workers at Logan Airport whose unfair treatment at the hands of their contractor, and Jet Blue Airlines led them to organize under SEIU 32BJ. And finally, **Jack Trumpbour** spoke about Catholic Social Teaching and the historical connection between faith and labor, using the example of Martin Luther King Jr., whose devotion to labor and the dignity of the working class led to the original Poor People's Campaign.

While all the speakers brought an educational element reflecting on their own work towards social justice, attendees then broke into smaller groups to focus on "next steps" and networking. Thanks to our excellent panelists and our very engaged discussion group participants, it was a wonderful gathering. The Guild hopes to continue to create collaborative spaces for greater interfaith education and action during the year.



## AIRPORT WORKERS ORGANIZE WITH FAITH COMMUNITY The Labor Guild supports SEIU campaign at Logan Airport

Since last fall December, the Labor Guild has been working with our allies at Massachusetts Interfaith Worker Justice (MIWJ) to support on ongoing unionization campaign by workers at Logan Airport. The workers, who are organizing with 32BJ SEIU, perform a wide range of tasks, including cleaning planes, security services, and providing wheelchair service to passengers with disabilities.

Though these services are vital for airlines, they are typically outsourced to smaller

contracting companies that can be more difficult to hold accountable than a widely known airline. The workers in this campaign are employed by two such contractors for JetBlue, called FSS and ReadyJet. These workers have been subject to health and safety violations, wage theft, sexual harassment, and harassment for organizing.

As part of their campaign, the workers have sought out support from clergy and faithbased community groups like MIWJ and the Labor Guild.

On December 21st, a group of clergy members from all different faiths, including long-time friend of the Guild Rev. Norm Faramelli, joined with workers to pray in the Logan Airport departures area and to deliver a letter about their working conditions and demands for better treatment. Beyond this public action, workers and organizers from 32BJ SEIU have also been regularly attending MIWJ meetings, showing a deep commitment to building ties with the faith and labor community.

Our Labor Guild Boyle Fellows joined in the December faith delegation, walked the picket line with workers during a two day strike this February, and, supported workers and community allies giving testimony at a MassPORT board meeting on June 21st (pictured above).

The Labor Guild is proud to stand in solidarity with Logan Airport workers and support their fight for dignity and respect at work!



- **4. Labor-Management Counsel** Attorneys in private practice serving as counsel for either management or labor. This year's award is for a labor-side attorney.

Nominees must work within the geographic area of the Archdiocese of Boston – that means, roughly, Eastern Massachusetts. Nominations are open to people of all faiths.
